"When it is not just Haemorrhoids"

Rectal bleeding of any kind in the stool or on tissue paper is not normal. Haemorrhoids frequently cause rectal bleeding and are benign. Assuming however that haemorrhoids are causing your rectal bleeding without assessment can delay diagnosis and treatment of a more serious digestive illness.

Haemorrhoids are unlikely to be the problem



- If you have chronic diarrhoea
- If you have severe abdominal pain
- If you have coloured rectal discharge
- If you have smelly rectal discharge





If faecal calprotectin or FIT test is high



If you have any of the above then colitis, crohn's disease, infections, polyps and bowel cancer amongst others could be masquerading as haemorrhoids.

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
